## Spiral Table Runner Workshop

The Workshop will be held after the meeting in October, 10/14/16 from 12:30 to 3:30-4:00. Any followup instructions will be done on the third Friday from 9:30 to ? There are 16 people signed up at this time. For those taking the workshop, patterns will be provided. Because of the limited time on the 14th, homework is already being posted so we can take off running (start cutting) first thing at 12:30. If we can do this we can finish in one afternoon.

You should all have your fabrics ready by the September meeting because I will give you a list of how you will cut the fabrics and sew them together in 4 pressed panels by the Workshop. You need 8 different fabrics that go well together and go from light to dark or blend from one color into another such as Red, White, & Blue OR Christmas colors, Red, Cream, Green, etc. You can use 8 fat quarters, or 8 quarter yards. You will cut them into strips that are all 22 inches long. You will also need batting and one yard of something for the backing. It's a good idea to snip a sample of each, tape them to a card, and number them in the order you want to use them. It can get confusing if you don't have them listed somehow to refer to "the darkest", or # 1, or # 8. Also a 9 degree ruler is required to construct this table runner. I have 2 available to use and if you have a buddy, two of you can share. We will count how many we have in September and see who may still have to buy one. Any questions, you may call me at anytime. Leave a message if we don't answer. We screen our calls. Judy – 215 234-4759. Have a good rest of the summer. Stay cool and HYDRATE.

**STASH SMASH** *this was sent by Marianne Saboe*

“Most of us have a stash that is too old, cluttered, and way out of style, yet we continue to hold onto it with white knuckles. Don’t. To increase your quilting creativity, you simply can’t be surrounded by clutter. Too much stash actually obstructs our creativity by overwhelming us and blocking our most creative thoughts. While some of us may think we thrive in chaos, research shows us that clutter and too much stimulation actually rattles us and then confuses us. For our quilting process to reap maximum quality in design and technique, we need to reclaim our space by getting rid of what we aren’t using. Besides being humiliating, a cluttered stash is a blow to our self worth and creative self-esteem. Toss it, donate, or bequeath it-just get rid of it. Open your space and take advantage of a fresh perspective and renewed patchwork vigor. “ And as Marianne mentioned, HelenMarie and her recycle room can benefit from the donations.

## Why Do Quilts Cost So Much?

Costs for materials, construction, & finishing for a 65" x 65" Throw Quilt.

### Materials for throw quilt:

#### Fabric for the top:

6 yds @ \$11 yd = \$66

5 yds Backing @ \$13 = \$65

2 yds of Bating @ \$11 = \$22

5/8 yd for Binding @ \$11 = \$6.88

**TOTAL Cost of Materials = \$159.88**

### Construction:

(Labor based on \$10/hr)

#### Making the top:

(Includes preparing the fabric, cutting the pieces, sewing the blocks, setting into rows, adding borders)

50 hours x \$10/hr = \$500

#### Assembling the Quilt Sandwich:

3 hours @ \$10/hr = \$30

#### Quilting on Domestic Machine:

(Charged by square inch in a simple all over design)

4225 sq in x \$0.15 = \$63.38

Thread for Quilting - \$15

**TOTAL Cost for Construction = \$768.26**

### Finishing:

#### Making the Binding:

2 hours x \$10 = \$20

#### Attaching the binding:

10 hours x \$10 = \$100

**TOTAL Finishing costs = \$120**

**TOTAL COST OF QUILT = \$888.26**

**Note:** A larger quilt, a more intricate pattern, a more elaborate quilting design will cause the price to increase.

## Diana's Golden Needle from Jane Nase

Diana Jasany is a very special young quilter. Adopted at 14 months old in 2001 from Kalmykia, Russia, Diana just turned 15 and will be entering 10th grade. She is working on a Girl Scout Gold Award project with some help from Facebook and a LOT of quilting friends! Diana started the [Diana's Golden Needle](#) Facebook page in February, 2015, to share her adoption story and help spread the word about foster care and adoption. That's not all! Her goal is to make 16 quilts for teens who age out of foster care in North Carolina. She didn't know how incredibly well her plan would be accepted by the quilting community, so she gave herself two years to achieve her goals and earn the Girl Scout Gold Award. Five quilts have been completed, and five are out to be quilted. She says, "Even if I achieve my goals earlier, I have decided to continue with this project until March, 2017, as planned and see how many quilts can be made and given away to the teenagers who really deserve them!"

Why was her original goal 16 quilts? "I would like to make 16 quilts for the 16 years that I will have lived here by the time my project will be complete. I also want to make smaller baby size quilts to send back to my Russian orphanage." She'll be making at least ten baby quilts for the ten months that she lived there.





### Constructing Hanging Sleeve for Quilts

1. Cut fabric for sleeve 9" wide x a length which is 1" shorter than the width of the quilt at the top. You may have to stitch several pieces together to achieve this length. The sleeve fabric(s) may coordinate with the backing fabric(s) or be totally unrelated – it's up to you.
2. Hem the short ends by folding under  $\frac{1}{2}$ ", pressing, then folding and pressing once more. Stitch.
3. Fold the fabric in half lengthwise, *wrong sides together* and press.
4. Bring each cut edge to the center fold and press. These two folds are your sewing guides – press them crisply. Unfold and, *wrong sides together*, sew the length of fabric with a  $\frac{1}{2}$ " seam allowance. Finger press the seam open.



5. Place one pressed edge of the sleeve approximately 1" from the top of the quilt, with the seamed side of the sleeve against the back of the quilt. Pin in place. Now place the pressed edge of the bottom of the sleeve to the quilt and pin. You will notice there is some bulk in the front of the sleeve – this will accommodate the pole for hanging.
6. Hand stitch the top pressed edge of the sleeve to the quilt back. Stitches need not be especially beautiful, but they must be sturdy so that the sleeve can support the weight of your quilt. To reduce the pull on the lining, catch some of the batting in the stitches (but not the front of the quilt). Continue to stitch the back edges of the ends of the sleeve and the bottom edge of the sleeve to the quilt.



**NOTE:** If your quilt is longer than 85", you must place the 4" sleeve so the top of the sleeve is 85" from the bottom of the quilt. The top of the quilt will be folded over the piping and the bottom of the quilt will clear the floor.

If you are submitting a quilt greater than 85" in length, please comply with this rule.


2 3/8 for binding from fold

Have 2 halves in rod pocket


Have extra material with - *ea.* make it flat

### CONSTRUCTING HANGING SLEEVE FOR QUILTS

1. Cut fabric for sleeve 9" wide x a length which is 1" shorter than the width of the quilt at the top. You may have to stitch several pieces together to achieve this length. The sleeve fabric(s) may coordinate with the backing fabric(s) or be totally unrelated - it's up to you.
2. Sew the long edges together, wrong side to wrong side, using a 1/2" seam. Press seam open. This puts the seam allowances on the outside of the sleeve.
3. Turn in and hem the ends of the sleeve.
4. Press the sleeve in half along its length, with the long seam at the midpoint of one side.



5. Place one pressed edge of the sleeve against the stitched edge of the binding, centering the sleeve along the top of the quilt, with the seamed side of the sleeve against the back of the quilt. Pin in place. Hand stitch the top pressed edge of the sleeve to the quilt back. Stitches need not be especially beautiful, but they must be sturdy so that the sleeve can support the weight of your quilt.
6. To stitch the remaining edges to the quilt, first prepare the bottom pressed edge of the sleeve. Keeping the back of the sleeve flat, lift and move the bottom pressed edge of the sleeve 1/2" toward the top of the sleeve and pin the "new" bottom edge of the sleeve in place. This causes the sleeve to bow out slightly, with the front of the sleeve now larger than the back. This type of sleeve helps to prevent distortion of the front of the quilt caused by the pole on which the quilt hangs. Hand stitch the back edges of the ends of the sleeve and the bottom edge of the sleeve to the quilt.



### Important Notice Regarding Sleeves For Large Quilts

Large quilts frequently are longer than the piping and drag on the floor. In the past, to protect your quilts, we have folded plastic or sheets under the bottom edge of the quilts. This is time consuming and does not look attractive. The plastic and sheets get kicked, stepped on and pushed out of place which requires more straightening. More importantly, the bottom of the quilt is always in danger of being stepped upon. We are adopting a policy now being implemented in many of the major quilt shows. If your quilt is longer than 85", you must place a 4" sleeve so the top of the sleeve is 85" from the bottom of the quilt. The top of the quilt will be folded over the piping and the bottom of the quilt will clear the floor.

If you are submitting a quilt greater than 85" in length, please comply with our new rule.
